Saving for a Special Goal

It is important to save money. You may save money to buy something special or just to have some "extra" money on hand. Saving is usually easier if you know what you plan to do with the money. Think about something special you want to save money for. How much money do you need? How will you save the money? On another sheet of paper, write out your goal and your saving plan. Share your plan with your family and then place it in your 4-H project folder.

Try This Activity—Budgeting to Spend, Save and Share

One of the first steps in being a good consumer is deciding how you are going to spend your money. How will you spend, save and share? You can purchase things immediately by spending a small amount of money. You can save money for weeks or months to buy something more expensive. You can also share your money with other people, churches, charities or other groups.

On a separate sheet of paper, make three columns with the headings "Spend," "Save" and "Share." Think about how you would like to use your money in each of the three ways. List five items in each column.



You could probably list more than five things for each column. There are many things we want to do, but we have to choose the most important things to spend our money on. Chances are, your parents use some form of a *budget* to help them keep up with how they spend their money each month. Now it's your turn to make a budget.

Let's pretend that you earn \$10 per week for an allowance; that's \$40 per month. Look at your lists for spending, saving and sharing. Make a budget for how you will spend your allowance on these things. Can you spend your money for everything on the lists? What do you need to leave out? Remember that it's OK to change your lists to fit your budget.

Be sure to share your budget with your parents or another adult or teen leader. They can help you if you have questions. Then, keep your budget in your 4-H project folder.

Sharing My Resources

Resources are things you can use to get what you want or need. Some of your resources are time, money, energy, talents, skills, knowledge and interests.

Resources are limited. You don't have enough resources to get everything you want or need. You must also share resources with your family. For example, the adults in your family earn money to pay for your family's wants and needs. Everyone must share the money to

get things they need and want. Sometimes you have to wait for what you want because another family member's needs or wants come first.

You've already made a list of the things you need and want. Now, ask other family members to tell you three things they need and three

things they want. Do you think some of these needs and wants are more important than yours? How can you work together to share your resources?

In a family, you also have to share other resources, such as time and skills. Imagine that you need a costume for a school play. Your mom can sew, but she needs to clean the family room. If you clean so she can sew, then both of you get what you want. You have shared your resources!

On a separate sheet of paper, list the resources that your family members have. Then, draw ways that you can share your resources. Share your drawing with your family and keep it in your 4-H project folder.

Service Ideas

- Make and display a poster about saving money.
- Donate gently used clothes or toys to charity.
- Keep an activity calendar updated for your family.
