**SPECIFIC AIR RIFLE COMPETITION RULES AND GUIDELINES**

(Changes in Red)**

**NATIONAL STD THREE-POSITION SPORTER AIR RIFLE**

1. **Age Classes:** There will be one age class: Senior – 9th-12th grade this fall and those who have already graduated this past May. (8th–12th grade as of January 1, 2020)
2. **Entry Fee:** There is a \$20.00 fee per entry
3. **Entry Limit:** There is no limit to the number of entries per county. Due to COVID-19 issues, all eligible individuals can register for this Fall event.
4. **Range Personnel -** Scorers, range safety officers, and volunteers will be designated and assigned by the Discipline Superintendent. These individuals are not allowed to coach while competitors are shooting.
5. **Target:** NRA AR 5/10 (Orion)
6. **Distance:** 10 meters or 33 feet
7. **Course of Fire:** 3 x 20. 20 shots each position: prone, standing, and kneeling in that order. (60 record shots); (Rule book reference – 5.3.3 Individual Event, 3x10)
8. **Time Limit:** 20 minutes prone, 30 minutes standing, and 20 minutes kneeling (Rule book reference – 5.3.3 Individual Event, 3x20)
9. **Scoring:** Targets will be scored using the Orion system.
10. **Awards:** Awards will be given to the top individuals. No paper scores or numbers will be posted. All results will be posted digitally after the match is complete and awards will be sent by mail.
11. **Qualifying:** This will be the qualifying match for the National 4-H Shooting Sports Championships in June 2021 in Grand Island, Nebraska (not all competitors may be eligible for Nationals).

12. **Equipment:** Approved Rifles/Air Rifles officially approved for Sporter Class air rifle competitions are the AirForce Air Guns Edge, Crosman CH2000 (CO2), Crosman CH2009 (CO2 or compressed air), Daisy M599, Daisy M853/753/953/853CM (pneumatic), Daisy 888/887 (CO2), Daisy XSV40 Valiant (compressed air), Air Arms T200 (compressed air, with non- adjustable cheekpiece and butt-plate) and the Champions Choice T200 (CZ 200T, compressed air, with adjustable cheek-piece and butt-plate). Daisy 887/888 rifles may have 2010 model replacement stocks. Any rifle not included in this list but complies with the requirements of the Sporter Air Rifle as stated in the National Standard Rules may be submitted to for a decision prior to the competition and may be added to the list of approved rifles.
13. **Clothing:** Shoes are restricted to soft, low cut, athletic or street shoes that do not extend above the ankles. **Shoes must be worn in all positions.** No boots are permitted. A shooting glove may be worn, but no shooting jackets are permitted. Up to two sweatshirts or clothing suitable for the prevailing weather are allowed. **Tight fitting under-garments known as compression clothing is not allowed. See Rule 4.3.1**

# Safety Protocols for Fall Air Rifle Jamboree

September 26, 2020 at Hyder Burks Arena, Animal Prep Area, Cookeville

1. Every person at the event will be required to wear a mask. Proper PPE will be provided to all staff and volunteers, and hand sanitizer will be available at all fields and indoor ranges. Extra PPE will be available if contestants arrive without what they need.
2. Mask will be required. However, because it could be considered a safety issue, competitors will not be required to wear their mask while shooting. The shooting stations will be 6 ft. apart. Each competitor may remove their mask after arriving at their station and before they start shooting. They will replace it before exiting the firing line and at any time they are going to be coming within 6 feet of a coach or range official while on the range.
3. Check in desk will be located outside (weather permitting) and will have a Plexiglas shield on the table. Participants will be expected to wait in line at least 6 ft. apart. Only verbal verification should be necessary during check in because all registration information must be handled in SUPER prior to the event.
4. Participants will complete all stages of the competition during 1 visit to the indoor range. This should mitigate interaction between groups.
5. Staggered range times will be sent out prior to the event to lower the number of people at the event and competitors will be encouraged to return home after they complete the competition.
6. No fees will be taken that day, so that will limit contact with participants and the workers.
7. Equipment inspection and weight testing will be done by staff who are wearing gloves and hand sanitizer will be used between each inspection. Only 1 participant will be allowed to present equipment at a time. Depending on number of staff and volunteers available, it is also possible that several equipment check stations may be set up in order to speed the inspection process.
8. Because of the nature of the sport and the age of the participants, equipment sharing is not usually a problem, however, NO equipment will be shared during this event.
9. All targets will be retrieved by a staff member with gloves and delivered to the scoring officials.
10. All target stands and range equipment will be wiped down and sanitized between individuals.
11. Parents and spectators will not be allowed to watch the completion due to the size of the room where the range will be set up. Only coaches and range staff will be present while the contestants are competing. Everyone will maintain the 6 ft social distancing rules and contestants and coaches will exit the range room after their competition.
12. All information will be placed on the targets prior to competition and therefore, no writing will be required during the competition.
13. The area used for verifying and inputting scores will be block off in order to help maintain social distance between workers and everyone else.
14. No paper scores or numbers will be posted. It will be all posted digitally after the match.
15. All results will be posted digitally and awards will be sent by mail.



**Tennessee 4-H Shooting Sports Fall Jamboree**  
**State 4-H Qualifier for the National 4-H Championships**

**GENERAL RULES**

All rules and guidelines are subject to change. The Tennessee 4-H Shooting Sports Fall Jamboree is the state qualifier for the National 4-H Championships, and follows all guidelines for Tennessee 4-H events. 4-H is the youth program of the University of Tennessee Extension and Tennessee State University Extension.

**Participants are to register through their County Extension Office.** By entry in these events, the County Extension Office and the county 4-H Shooting Sports coordinator is verifying that the youth entered are knowledgeable and proficient in the safe use of the equipment and the fundamentals of the event. Match and/or range officials may dismiss or disqualify a participant if he/she believes the participant does not demonstrate the basic proficiency and knowledge required. Entry is limited to **those individuals who are enrolled in 9<sup>th</sup> -12<sup>th</sup> grade this fall and those who have graduated this past May. (8<sup>th</sup> – 12<sup>th</sup> on January 1, 2020).**

1. **4-H membership** - All bona fide, active, 4-H Shooting Sports members are eligible to compete in 4-H Shooting Sports events, subject to limitations imposed by the specific event and the rules for active membership instituted by Tennessee 4-H. **4-H Shooting Sports members are those 4-H youth who have been under the direction of a Certified 4-H Shooting Sports Instructor.** Contact your County UT Extension office for 4-H membership.
2. **Disciplines offered** – The disciplines offered for competition will be Air Rifle, **Air Pistol**, Compound Archery, Recurve Archery, and Shotgun.
3. **Age Classes** - **There will be one age class: Senior – 9th-12th grade this fall and those who have already graduated this past May. (8th–12th grade as of January 1, 2020)**
4. **Entry Limit** - **Due to COVID-19 issues, all eligible individuals can register for this Fall event.**
5. **National 4-H Competition Eligibility** – The top four individual winners will become eligible to represent Tennessee 4-H at the National 4-H Shooting Sports Championships in Grand Island, Nebraska in June. **Participants must be 14 to 18 years of age on January 1st of 2021 to compete next summer.** Individuals may compete at the National 4-H Championships in a certain discipline only once.

6. **Official Entry** – Pre-registration is required to participate in this event. An entry fee is also required. **Deadline for pre-registration and entry fees is August 28 for Shotgun, September 11 for Archery, Air Rifle, & Air Pistol. (Counties may impose earlier deadlines). Participants are to register through their County Extension Office. County Extension Office must register through SUPER.**
7. **Fee Schedule** – A fee of **\$20.00** will be assessed for every entry in Air Rifle, Air Pistol, and Archery. A fee of **\$45.00** will be assessed for every entry in Shotgun. Entry fees are due with registration. (Counties may impose earlier deadlines).
8. **Range Personnel** - The scorers and range safety officers will be designated by the Discipline Superintendent.
9. **Individual participation** – All competition will be individual.
10. **Medical Consent Form & Adult Supervision** - It is the responsibility of each County to have the appropriate health consent and release forms for each of their participants and adult supervisors (600A, 600B, or 600C, see link for Health / Code of Conduct forms at <https://4h.tennessee.edu/forms-and-materials/>). An adult supervisor/coach/manager should be present at the event site, with immediate access to the forms, any time their youth are participating in any 4-H Shooting Sports event. The Tennessee State 4-H Program is not responsible for medical authorization and health history of the participants.
11. **Awards** – **Due to COVID-19, all awards will be posted online. Awards will include only top individuals in each discipline.** There will be a “Champions Division” in each discipline for those that have already competed at the National 4-H Championships.
12. **Safety** – Safety must be the number one priority of range personnel, participants, and spectators. Standard accepted safety rules will be followed at all times, special safety considerations will be announced at each venue. The Discipline Superintendent, Range officers, or other event staff may dismiss anyone from the range for unsafe behavior. The score may be forfeited, participant disqualified, or spectators barred at the discretion of the range staff. **Due to COVID-19, there will be social distancing guidelines in effect at all events.**
13. **Eye and Ear Protection Requirement** - Adequate eye protection (shooting glasses, safety glasses or safety goggles, or hardened prescription glasses) are required for all competitors in the rifle and shotgun discipline. Ear protection is also required for shotgun participants. **Electronic hearing protection is acceptable; however, NO Bluetooth or corded hearing protection may be connected to any device.** Coaches or spectators on or

near firing lines are subject to the same requirements.

14. **Coaches** – Each County shall designate one coach per firing line, unless otherwise stated in the specific competition rules. This coach is the adult permitted to discuss procedures, ask questions, or advocate for his/her team with range officials. This coach should be designated on the entry form.
15. **Coaching** - As a general rule, limited coaching is permitted. (See individual discipline coaching guidelines.) However, coaching must never disturb other participants. Each County is limited to 1 coach per firing line, unless otherwise stated in the specific competition rules. A coaching line will be established on each range - behind the shooters area and firing line and separate from the spectator area. Except during preparation time, coaches are to stay behind the firing line and in the coaching area. Coaches may assist the shooter during prep time only. **Once shooting for record begins, no coaching is permitted. In the case of equipment issue, a shooter may request for coach assistance, but it must be initiated by the shooter, the coach may not initiate contact with the shooter. Coaches may ask the line officer to have their pupil come back to talk, but is not to initiate contact with the shooter, (for encouragement only, no coaching discussions, i.e. sights, lead, stance, anchor, etc.).** The shooter will put down their equipment, make it safe, leave the line, and then go talk to their coach. Coaches may not handle firearms or equipment after the match begins nor advance to the firing line unless authorized by the range officer. A coach may set up his/her own spotting equipment.
16. **No Smoking** - No smoking is permitted on or near the firing lines or in any situation where the smoke constitutes an interference to shooters. Smoking by minors is prohibited by law and is not permitted on the grounds at any time.
17. **Alcohol Policy** - No alcoholic beverages may be consumed on the grounds. Violation of this policy is grounds for ejection.
18. **Dress Code** - Participants are expected to dress appropriately. Team uniforms or shirts are encouraged, but not required. Both young people and adults should wear attire appropriate for the weather while remaining modest and socially acceptable. **Participants are required to wear shoes that completely cover the foot on all ranges.** Clothing with sexually suggestive wording or graphics; and alcohol or tobacco advertisement is not appropriate. Range officials have the final word concerning the dress code and may announce or address specific cases. All shooters and coaches should remember that they may be having photographs taken or be asked to interview for the media. Remember that you represent all of 4-H. Make it a positive image!
19. **Behavior and Sportsmanship** - All participants and spectators are expected to demonstrate the highest level of sportsmanship, supporting the objectives and ideals promoted by 4-H. Shooters or coaches will render aid and/or

testimony if asked to do so by any match official.

20. **Rules - Knowledge of procedures and rules** – This event may also follow guidelines set forth by a **National Governing Body (NGB)**. Where there is conflict regarding these rules and rules set forth by the NGB, these rules supersede. It is the shooters' and coach's responsibility to read the NGB and event rulebooks and understand the procedures used in each event and comply with the rules and standards of the events. Questions are encouraged to clarify any areas of misunderstanding or ignorance. Ignorance of the rules does not obviate their existence. Shooters are responsible for knowing the rules and staying within them. Learning the rules of the event is part of the educational process for 4-H Shooting Sports participants.
21. **Physically Disabled Shooters** – A shooter who because of physical disability cannot fire from one or more of the prescribed shooting positions outlined in these rules, or who must use special equipment when firing, is privileged to petition to the *Discipline Superintendent* for permission to assume a special position or to use modified equipment or both. This petition will be in the form of a written request from the person concerned to the Committee (discipline superintendent) outlining in detail the reasons why the special position must be assumed or the special equipment must be used. The petition will be accompanied by pictures of the shooter in the position desiring approval and, if special equipment is required, the picture will show how this equipment is used. The petition and all pictures must be furnished in exact duplicate. The petition must be accompanied by a medical doctor's statement if the physical disability is not completely evident in the pictures submitted.
- a. Each petition will be reviewed by the *Tennessee 4-H Shooting Sports State Committee*. The committee may require additional or supplementary statements or pictures. After review the *Discipline Superintendent* will be instructed by the committee to issue special authorization to individuals who submit petitions and pictures which have been approved. Such certificates will have necessary pictures attached.
  - b. Shooters who have received special authorization will be required to carry them when competing and to present the certificate when requested by officials of the match. In the case of a protest involving the position or the equipment used by such a shooter, the range officials will compare the questioned position or equipment with the certificate and photographs presented by the shooter.
22. **Challenges** - Shooters only, may review their own targets and challenge the scoring. Once targets have been scored, they will be available for review, if applicable, by shooters for a period of 30 minutes unless otherwise posted. Upon completion of that time period the scores may no longer be challenged. Challenges must be accompanied by a fee of \$1 per hole being challenged. A jury (not including the original scorer) will review the challenge and

pronounce their findings to the challenger. If the challenge is upheld, the \$1 will be returned to the shooter. If the challenge is rejected, the fee will be deposited in the Tennessee 4-H Shooting Sports funds. No fee is required to point out mathematical errors. **For this Shotgun event, Challenges will only be accepted for 24 hours after the online results are posted.**

23. **Protests** - Competitors only (no adults), may protest; a) an injustice they feel has been done them individually; b) the conditions under which another competitor was permitted to fire; or c) the equipment another competitor was permitted to use. **How to protest** – Official protests may be filed in the following order to seek redress of alleged wrongs.
- a. Range Scorer – The protest is made orally to the range scorer. If not satisfied with that immediate decision;
  - b. Range Jury – The protest may be stated orally to the jury of 2 or more officials present at the match (excluding team affiliations, parents, coaches, agents, etc.), indicating the decision of the range scorer. The jury should include a member of the Competition Management as well as the range scorer. If not satisfied with this decision,
  - c. Discipline Superintendent/Jury – The protest must be submitted in writing to the Discipline Superintendent, accompanied by a \$25 cash protest fee, within 30 minutes of the conclusion of the occurrence. The match jury will consider the statement, may ask questions of the shooter and range officials and will render a decision in an expeditious manner. Coaches, parents, and other parties may not participate in the process. The decision rendered by the jury is final and no further appeal is possible. If the protest is ruled valid, the fee will be returned.

**24. All rules and guidelines for the host venue will apply.**
