TITLE: “A Integrating Global Programming in Your County Program”

OBJECTIVES:

- Introduce the global connections curriculum
- Bring awareness to different cultures across the world
- Promote the States 4-H Exchange Program

DESCRIPTOR:

Tennessee 4-H members need opportunities for global experiences. In recording information in their e-portfolios, 4-H'ers are expected to list international experiences, yet we offer very few. The very popular, States 4-H Exchange Program is one possibility but not all 4-H members have the ability to house a foreign exchange student.

Participants in this training will learn about the new Tennessee 4-H Global Connections Curriculum Guide. There are lessons that have a focus on global connections, along with hands-on opportunities, that agents can use as a “Grab & Go” program with little preparation. Agents will also learn more about the State 4-H Exchange Program and how their 4-H'ers can be involved.

TITLE: “Helping You to Help Others: Mental Health Discussion Guide and Topics for 4-H Agents”

INSTRUCTOR: Lynne Middleton, Janiece Pigg and National Alliance on Mental Health (NAMI) Representative

OBJECTIVES:

- Define mental health and mental health concerns
- Identify mental health symptoms and traits
- Identify methods of treatment for mental health concerns
- Hear firsthand about mental health journeys from presenters who are in recovery

DESCRIPTOR:

Mental health in teens is becoming a more prominent issue in Tennessee. According to the Tennessee Department of Education’s AWARE Initiative. An estimated 17.1 of 74.5 million in the U.S. have or have had a psychiatric disorder—more than the number of children with cancer, diabetes, and AIDS combined. Half of all mental illness occurs before the age of 14 and 75% by the age of 24. In spite of the magnitude of the problem, lack of awareness and entrenched stigma keep the majority of young people from getting help. In fact, fewer than half of young people with mental illness receive adequate treatment. Suicide is the second leading cause of death for young people (ages 10-19) in Tennessee. In 2018, there were 49 deaths among persons aged 10-19 (TDOH). But there is hope. The recovery rate for mental illness is 90%.

Helping middle and high schoolers understand mental illness makes a big difference. By introducing the National Alliance on Mental Health (NAMI) “Ending the Silence” program to 4-H Agents across the state, we will raise awareness and change perceptions around mental health conditions. Through this training, agents will learn to see the reality of living with a mental health condition. During the presentation, a young adult living in recovery with mental illness and a family member tell their stories about mental health challenges, including what coping mechanisms were effective and ineffective on their recovery journey.

TITLE: “B.E.S.T.: Building Exceptionally Skilled Teachers”

INSTRUCTOR: Lori Gallimore

DESCRIPTOR:

The goal of B.E.S.T. is to equip Extension educators to enhance the quality of their teaching. B.E.S.T. consists of three legs, Preparation, Presentation, and Professionalism. Each leg will address an important component of teaching.



- **Day One (half day):** Students deliver a prepared presentation for evaluation with the following learning outcomes:
 - (1) Evaluation by instructor, peers and self
 - (2) Identify personal deficiencies in public speaking and teaching skills

- Day Two (full day):** Participants are exposed to various techniques that will improve public speaking and teaching skills with the following learning outcomes:
- (1) Gain knowledge necessary to improve public speaking skills
 - (2) Learn how to organize a presentation
 - (3) Address various methods of presenting (including online and face-to-face)
 - (4) Understand the importance of audience involvement

- Day Three (half day):** Participants will redesign and then redeliver their previous presentation via Zoom given on “day one” based on their evaluations and knowledge gained from “day two” of the training. The delivery will be conducted in an online format via Zoom, rather than face-to-face. The objective is to document student improvement with the following learning outcomes:
- (1) Develop confidence and effectiveness in public speaking and teaching
 - (2) Improve the quality of life/well-being of families of participants that attend UT/TSU Extension presentations
 - (3) Use knowledge and skill gained from training to create an effective online presentation
 - (4) Recognize differences that must be taken into account regarding the design between online and face-to-face presentations
