IMAGE COMPOSITION

Outcome: Evaluate five images for their composition

EXPLORE: Step Out Activity

In photography, the term "composition" refers to the arrangement of visual elements within a photograph's frame. Essentially, composition is the photographer's way of "making a picture," not just taking it. The photographer consciously arranges the visual elements to create a meaningful and engaging photograph.

Locate five photographs you want to evaluate. They can be of anything – they just need to have elements in them you can assess. Once you have found your five photographs, evaluate them based on the rubric below.
